A B O U T T H E F I L M

When the killing stops, wounds don't magically heal. Trauma doesn't disappear overnight, and orphans are still orphans, even during peacetime.

This film takes a long perspective, listening to the stories of one survivor over the course of many years.

LOGLINE

Over the course of more than a decade, Josiane cares for her family as they navigate life as genocide survivors.

SYNOPSIS

Josiane is only six years old when her parents are killed by genocidal militias. She escapes, hiding among the bodies. After the massacre, she reunites with her siblings and, like so many orphans in Rwanda, they rebuild a life for themselves, finding the scraps of their home and surviving by selling bananas.

They become one of Rwanda's "child-headed households." Over the following years, Josiane provides for her siblings and holds the family together, in spite of being the youngest. She continues to put her family first, leaving school and taking in her sister's children and other young relatives.

She sacrifices countless things, from her appearance to her dreams, to make sure her family has a good life.

But, she reflects, the children in her life call her "mama." Her days are full of love. And against all odds, she's made it to adulthood.

DIRECTOR

Ten years of loving labor are distilled in this film. Director Andrew Bilindabagabo's long journey with Josiane started in 2010, conducting multiple interviews over the years.

That sense of time is present in the film; as Josiane's life progresses, her reflections on her experience evolve and expand into meditations on trauma and modern Rwandan society.

WHY ANDREW?

Andrew is a Rwandan filmmaker, deeply connected to the land and its people, capable of making an African film in a truly African way. He's also a trained filmmaker capable of making a documentary in a technically and artistically masterful way.

We've all seen the western coverage of the Rwandan genocide. But Rwandan filmmakers with the platform to tell their own stories are rare. As the media world begins to understand the importance of hearing representative voices, it's time to revisit the story of modern Rwanda, as told by Rwandans.
